Retransmission Consent affects our customers

Often, a change in our business doesn't have any affect on you. However, something called 'Retransmission Consent' will impact customers who receive cable television services.

It used to be that broadcast channels, like KCCI, Fox, WHO and WOI would ask that we carry their signal on our cable system.

It was a jointly beneficial arrangement. Our customers received the local channels on the cable system, and the broadcaster's programming and advertisers received a wider audience – often because we were boosting their signal when we placed it on the system.

Now, broadcasters require that we sign a Retransmission Consent agreement AND pay them per customer to carry their signal on our system.

The bottom line is, that most likely, these new costs will cause us to raise the price of our cable TV service at some point in the future. This is just another case of programming costs spinning out of control.

Low income lowans may qualify for assistance

Assistance in paying your telephone bill is available to qualifying low-income lowans as part of two federal support programs. These programs, 'Lifeline Assistance' and 'Link-Up', are available through Guthrie Center Communications.

'Lifeline' is a plan that assists qualified low-income lowans by providing a monthly credit on their telephone bill up to \$8.25.

'Link-Up' is an assistance plan that helps qualified low-income lowans pay for the installation of basic telephone service by reducing connection charges by 50 percent, or \$30, whichever is less.

Another feature of the Lifeline program enables qualified applicants to avoid paying a service deposit if they voluntarily agree to have long distance calling blocked from their telephone.

lowans who participate in one or more of the following programs are eligible: Medicaid, Food Stamps, Supplemental

Lifeline and Link-up are available to qualifying customers



Security Income, Federal Public Housing Assistance, Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program, Temporary Assistance to Needy Families Program or the National School Lunch Program.

Application forms can be obtained from our office or at the local and county offices of the Department of Human Services, Area Agency on Aging, and the Community Action Program offices of the Department of Human Rights.
